the singular and plural. For regular verbs, the -ar , -er or -ir at the end is replaced with the appropriate ending.

Introduction to Spanish Verb Conjugation

A verb in Spanish must have one of three endings in the infinitive: '...ar', '...er', '...ir'. What is significant here is that the '...ir' and '...er' verb endings of regular verbs are identical in nearly all tenses and moods with very few exceptions. Future Subjunctive is nowadays only found in literature and legal language.

There are only two sets of endings for regular imperfect verbs in Spanish, one for -ar verbs and one for both -er and -ir verbs. To conjugate a regular verb in the imperfect tense in Spanish, simply remove the infinitive ending (-ar , -er , or -ir) and add the imperfect ending that matches the subject.
